Description:

The student will survey American history from the time of the Native Americans and first European explorers through the administration of Barack Obama. The course discusses actions and developments on the national level, especially involving the Federal government, as well as issues and events in American culture. A special emphasis is placed on the role of slavery and subsequent racial issues in American American Carapologia.

Assignment Structure

- Class Attendance/Participation: Attendance and participation are important for success in this course. Students are expected to arrive to class on time. It is recommended that the student enter the online classroom several minutes before the start of class to ensure any technical difficulties are promptly resolved. Absences will require an excuse note from the parent emailed to the instructor. Participation includes asking and answering questions during class utilizing the 'chat' feature, occasional reading, and discussion boards.
- **Readings:** Each student will be required to read the assigned material (25 40 pages per week). The student will answer honestly whether the readings were completed on the weekly Homework/Reading Quiz. Each week's readings/assignments must be completed before the scheduled class.
- Quizzes and Exams: Quizzes and exams will be in the form of matching, multiple choice, true/false, and short answer essays. Unit quizzes will be assigned every week. Unit exams will be assigned every 5 – 6 weeks. Both will be administered through Canvas.
- Assignments: These will vary from week to week, but should help deepen the students understanding of American History.
- End-of-the-year project: Students will be required to produce an end-of-the-year project covering a topic of their choosing using a method they prefer to show me that they have learned said topic. Projects have included 5-6 page research paper, diorama, PPT presentation, newspaper article, media recording, etc. Each student will work independently with the instructor to determine the content and method of end-of-the-year presentation.

Grading:

- Numeric Grade Scale: We grade all assignments, etc. using a numeric system of 0-100. As parents record the numeric grades they can convert those to letter grades using any conversion system they wish to use for their Homeschool.
- Students can continue to turn in assignments past their due date (and time), but a 5% per day deduction is applied for late assignments. Parents have full authority to modify that late grade, but it will not be reflected in the class portal.

• Numeric Grade Availability

Parents and students are responsible for saving/printing the student's numeric grades at the end of the course for their personal records.

PARENT REMINDERS:

- This class provides assistance to you through lecturing, grading, and other course questions.
- While I will be numerically grading your student's work, periodically check to make sure you are aware of their progress.
- As the parent, you are responsible for truly assigning your students final letter grade(s) using the conversion system of your choosing. What I am doing is merely grading (numerically 0-100) assignments turned in to the class portal ON TIME, but you have full control to handle LATE assignments as you see fit.
- You will proctor your student's Unit Exams.
- All final records/transcripts are prepared by you as your student's legal
 homeschool institution. You are responsible for issuing transcripts and report cards
 as Apologia is not a school that provides such documentation.
- You need to print your student's numeric grades within 2 weeks of the end of class. After that grades cannot be retrieved and will be removed from the system.

Due Dates and Late Policy:

• 5% per day deduction is applied for late assignments. Parents have full authority to modify that late grade, but it will not be reflected in the class portal and will have to be manually calculated by the parent.
