Description:

This course combines the study of world geography with the exploration of international relations, diplomacy, and global affairs through a biblical worldview. Beginning with a foundational understanding of geography, students will learn how physical, cultural, and political landscapes shape global dynamics. The course will then delve into the principles of diplomacy and the complexities of international relations, offering insights into global challenges, conflict resolution, and the role of the United States in the world.



Each topic will be evaluated through the lens of biblical principles and ethics, fostering a deeper understanding of how faith informs engagement in global issues.

Course Topics:

Key topics include:

- Foundations of World Geography: Understand the world in spatial terms by utilizing maps, geospatial technologies, and geographic tools to acquire, process, and report spatial information.
- **Geography's Influence on Global Affairs**: Explore the physical and human characteristics of places and how these shape regions, interactions, and global dynamics.
- Introduction to Global Affairs and Diplomacy: Examine the relationship between geography, politics, and diplomacy, considering how spatial contexts influence international relations.
- **Theology and Ethics in Diplomacy**: Analyze human-environment interactions and how cultural and ethical perspectives inform global decisions.
- **History of Diplomacy**: Trace the role of human systems, including population migration and economic interdependence, in shaping diplomatic history.
- **International Relations Theories**: Investigate the spatial distribution of human systems and their relevance to global interactions and cooperation.
- Conflict Resolution and Mediation: Understand human settlement patterns and their impact on resource distribution, cooperation, and conflict.



- **Global Hotspots and Challenges**: Study physical systems such as ecosystems and climate patterns and their influence on geopolitical challenges.
- The Role of the United Nations and International Organizations: Explore how physical and human systems are addressed in global efforts to foster cooperation and address shared challenges.
- **Practical Applications of Diplomacy**: Apply geographic knowledge to interpret current global events and plan for future challenges with a biblical worldview.

This course equips students with a comprehensive understanding of the interconnected world and the tools to approach global affairs with integrity, wisdom, and a biblical perspective.
