Course Topics:

The historical eras we will explore and evaluate from a Biblical worldview include, but are not limited to:

- Classical Greece, Rome, and Early Christianity: The cultural and political legacies that shaped Western civilization and the spread of the Gospel.
- **African History**: The rich heritage and contributions of African societies throughout history.
- The Early Middle Ages and the Development of European Nations: The growth of Christendom and the shaping of medieval Europe.
- **Pre-Columbian America**: The civilizations of the Americas prior to European contact.
- The Renaissance and the Reformation: A revival of art and learning alongside the transformative impact of the Protestant Reformation.
- The Enlightenment and Humanism: The shift toward reason and individualism and its challenges to Biblical principles.
- **The French Revolution**: The quest for liberty and its consequences on society and faith.
- **Industrial Progress**: Technological advancements and their impact on humanity and moral ethics.
- **Democratic Nationalism and European Imperialism**: The rise of nation-states and the spread of European influence around the globe.
- **WWI, WWII, and Other Military Conflicts**: The global conflicts that shaped the modern era and the role of faith amidst war.



This course offers a comprehensive study of these eras, always considering how history reflects God's sovereignty and humanity's need for redemption.
